Robert was already in the Coldstream Guards before the war broke and is maybe why he does not appear on the 1911 census as he would have been 18yrs then. He had wanted to join the police force but he was just under the height required and as the police force was so strict in those days it was suggested he joined one of the armed forces.

All three battalions of Coldstream Guards left England for the front immediately on the outbreak of war in 1914. In the week 22-29 October 1914 the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion were involved in action around Langemark which is between Ypres and Passchendale. During this week the Battalion sustained heavy casualties and lost more men than any other regiment during the first months of war.

"Mrs Balls, of Irstead, after more than two years of suspense and silence, has at last been officially informed of the death of her son, who was in the Coldstream Guards." *Text as it appears in "The Waxham Rural Deanery Magazine" April 1917, under the heading of "Barton Turf" written by J.G.
