My dear Mother & Family

I want you all to be as brave as possible, for it's sad news that I've got to inform you of this morning, Alfred being killed in our great battle on Sat. It will come a great blow to you all I know but we must look at it as bright as possible, for mother he fell with nearly all the rest of our N.C.Os together with our Captain, the best in the world.

I've got to buck up & bear it bravely, for sac case is hard enough, but I had fellows around me that morning who have lost two & three brothers in the fight, & I must only thank God, to think that I am alive. He fell *thinking of* you I went through it all in the thickest & came out without a scratch.

Mother I/we have the sympathy of the whole of D Company with us this morning, he was known & liked by the whole company.

I can't but help feel proud to think I am his brother & you his mother, for he played a good part & put wonderful confidence in his men, he died the death of a *fine* Englishman.

You must tell Florence that Percy was wounded in the arm nothing serious, he's a lucky chap. Charlie Blake wasn't in it. Mathies is wounded in the shoulder.

Now Mother I can't write more this morning, do bear up & help me, for our case is only one of thousands, & you will hear how our Company has suffered when they all receive the official news.

Pleased to say we are now out of it & having a well earned rest, have written to Alfred's wife this morning. God be with us till we meet again.

Your ever loving son Percy

Will write again further Don't worry yourselves.

Transcript of letter sent home from Percy Fox, telling his mother and family of the death of his brother Alfred, who is listed on the Neatishead Roll of Honour in the New Victory Hall as Alfred E Fox Private 9th Norfolk. This letter is held at the Norfolk Regimental Museum.
