## **AUGUST, 1916.**

The sad news of the death of their son John, reached Mr. and Mrs. Newstead on Monday, July 10<sup>th</sup>. He had been severely wounded in the trenches on July 4<sup>th</sup>, and had been taken to the hospital at Abbeville in France, where he passed peacefully away. He was respected and beloved by all who knew him, and we offer to his parents our deep and heartfelt sympathy in their sorrow and bereavement. A memorial service was held on Sunday, July 16<sup>th</sup>, at which many were present to pay their last mark of respect.

We also wish to express our sincere sympathy with Mrs. Poppy in the death of her son, Charles, which occurred on Saturday, July 15<sup>th</sup>, at Kelling Sanatorium, Holt. He had left home for the seat of war just twelve months ago, and, through exposure and exhaustion on the battlefield, had developed consumption, accompanied by haemorrhage. The funeral took place on July19th, when Mr. Edwards kindly came to assist.

The 8th (Service) Battalion as part of the 53rd Brigade of the 18th (Eastern) Division was present on the first day of the Battle of the Somme on 1 July 1916. They got beyond their initial target and had by 5.00pm reached the German trenches known as "Montauban Alley". Over one hundred men and three officers had been killed.
